## Maundy Thursday Prayer Vigil

*From 9:00 p.m., Thursday, April 1  
'til Noon, Good Friday, April 2.*

A prayer vigil will begin at the conclusion of the Maundy Thursday evening service; it continues through the night and concludes Good Friday at noon. Those who have signed-up take turns spending an hour in quiet meditation and prayer, keeping vigil with our Lord as he wept and prayed before his betrayal, trial, and crucifixion. The inspiration for the vigil is from the Gospels of Mark and Matthew, when, in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus asks the sleeping disciples, "Could you not watch one hour? Watch and pray..." (Mark 14:38). This devotional practice has been a part of Holy Week tradition since the early church. Those who participate in the vigil find it to be a meaningful time of prayer and devotion. An hour may be kept by one or more persons. Look for the sign-up chart and further instructions in the narthex or see Melissa Neufeld for more information. ***If you did not sign up, but wish to come, please feel free.***

# 2010 Outreach Calendar

An Outreach Committee consisting of: Mary Hayselden, Vincy Abraham, June and Nate Cassingham, Mike and Maxine Jones, Jim Speicher (representing Cindy), Brenda Carl, Jim Darnell, and Debra Callaway (chairman) met Friday, March 12, and planned the following calendar of outreach activities. We welcome new ideas throughout the year. Another Outreach dinner meeting is planned for this summer to reevaluate these plans.

**March** – Mary Hayselden will contact Jay Lenertz with Episcopal Community Services to assess current local needs. We would like to make a one-time \$500 contribution from the Agape Fund to help with these needs. (This replaces our usual Lenten ERD collection).

**April** – Vincy Abraham will administer a special Agape collection for the month of April to be sent to a Home of Hope for HIV infected children in India. All Agape contributions in April will be included in this one-time contribution.

**May** – Annual Shrimp Boil

**June** – Cindy Speicher will administer a stuffed animal collection to be given to an inner city fire department for distribution to children who have lost all toys in a house fire. New and clean, gently used toys may be contributed.

**July** – Kate Wood and daughters (surprise, Kate!) will be asked to spearhead a canned fruit drive to be donated to St. Paul's food pantry and possibly other local food pantries, depending on the number of cans we collect.

**August** – Open. (Any ideas?)

**September** – Debra Callaway will administer a coat and blanket collection City Union Mission or other community service groups.

**October** – Maxine Jones will organize a "Christmas in October" project in which volunteers will rake leaves, clean gutters, paint, and do minor home repair for elderly or disabled persons in our community.

**November** – We are considering Thanksgiving gift cards or gift baskets to needy families (maybe through the "Snack pack" program).

**December** – Debra Callaway will administer the "adoption" of several families through Operation Breakthrough. The needy children's names will be distributed to parishioners.

Ongoing Outreach activities include contributions to St. Paul's food pantry, serving breakfast once a month at St. Paul's, and our "Snack Pack" program.

## Our Outreach Ministry for April

**Project Prathyasha** ("Home of Hope") was initiated to look after the needs of a very vulnerable section of our society, HIV-affected orphans in Chennai, India. It is a Christian organization run by a group of volunteers from the Orthodox Christian church of India, Mar Thomas Church of India, and Church of South India based in Chennai, India.

The objectives of Prathyasha are: To fully address the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of orphan children To provide free shelter, food, education, clothing and health care; To extend counseling, psychological support and community care for children; To equip orphans with life skills and morals; To establish a vocational training center for children above 15 yrs of age; To bring awareness on AIDS and AIDS-related issues.

If interested, you can support this organization in ways like **Sponsor-a-child**. A contribution of just Rs.5000 (~\$110) a month can transform a child's life. With your contribution, it is possible for a HIV+ child to receive a good education, nutrition, medical care, accommodation and any other personal needs for a whole month. Your money goes directly to supporting the child.

Prathyasha will e-mail you a profile and photograph of the child you have sponsored, followed by regular updates on his/her progress. You can send your contribution to us in advance every 3, 6, or 12 months, or as you prefer. Your pledge will dramatically improve the course of their life. Sponsor-A-Meal

Days that are significant to you or your dear ones, such as birthdays, anniversaries or other forms of celebration, can be shared with the 12 children of Prathyasha by sponsoring all their meals for that day at Rs. 3000 (~\$66.00). The children of Prathyasha will remember you in their prayers on that very special occasion.

# A Moment of Meditation ...

***“Why are you looking in a tomb for someone who is alive? He isn’t here! He has risen from the dead!”***

— Luke 24:5-6

## Lessons from Easter Morning

There are a number of things we should learn from that first Easter morning some two thousand years ago.

First, Easter reminds us that God loves ordinary and flawed people. They don’t come any more flawed than Peter, John, and Mary. Remember, Mary was a demon-possessed woman-but Jesus healed her and transformed her life (see Luke 8:2). He not only forgave her but also commissioned her to go and take this message to the world. This gives hope to all of the ordinary people out there. You, who were picked last for the team. You, who never won the contest. You, who never distinguished yourself in any significant way from the others. This message from the Resurrection reminds us that God can do extraordinary things through ordinary people.

Secondly, Easter stands as living proof that God blesses those who seek Him with their whole heart. There is no questions that Mary’s persistent faith and love was richly rewarded. She was last at the cross. She was first at the tomb. She just wanted to be close to Jesus. She loved the Lord and wanted the world to know. She made time early in the morning to be with Him. If you will make time in your life and in your schedule for Jesus, He will reward you as well. The Bible says, “Great is his faithfulness; his mercies begin afresh each day” (Lamentations 3:23-24). But some of us will say, “I don’t have time for Bible study or prayer. I have so many things to do.” If that’s the case, then maybe you need to slow down and make time for what is important. God will bless you for that. Mary made time for Jesus. What a blessing she received!

The third lesson we need to learn is that Easter reveals the promise that God will more than meet us

halfway. Here was a woman who was weakened in her faith but strong in her love. She came with what she had and Jesus more than met her half way. Maybe you have a weakened faith? A tragedy has befallen you. A loved one has died. A marriage has collapsed. Your faith has suffered. Maybe in your estimation, you feel as though God has somehow let you down. God wants to renew your faith. He wants to bring you back to that place of fervency and commitment. Just as He ministered to Mary, He can minister to you as well.

Finally, Easter gives us hope for now and eternity. Mary was so excited because what appeared to have been the worst defeat imaginable remarkably turned out to be the greatest victory of all. The fact that Jesus Christ rose from the dead means that there is hope in this life and hope after it.

In the words of the Apostle Paul, Easter supplies us with hope in this life because, “The Spirit of God, who raised Jesus from the dead, lives in you. And just as he raised Christ from the dead, *he will give life to your mortal body* by this same Spirit *living within you*” (Romans 8:11, emphasis mine). Paul is saying that God has provided every Christian with the power to live this life He has called us to live. I admit, living the Christian life can be hard, but it is possible through the power of the Holy Spirit. The same Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead has taken residence in you. The same Spirit whom Jesus breathed on the disciples is living inside of you. He will enable you to be the woman or man that God has called you to be.

But Easter also reveals the hope of life after death, because if Jesus died and rose again, we too will be raised like Him. The Apostle Paul made this point in his letter to the church in Corinth:

*“But now Christ is risen from the dead, and has become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since by man came death, by Man also came the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, even*

*so in Christ all shall be made alive."*

— 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians 15:20-22 NKJV)

The Bible says that you are going to fall asleep and go into the presence of God. That is the picture Scripture uses. Because Jesus died and rose again, you have life beyond the grave. The Apostle Paul tells us, ***"For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who sleep in Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 4:14 NKJV).*** Whatever stage of life that you are in, this promise is precious. We, as believers, will live forever with God in heaven.

This is what happened Easter morning. God through Christ conquered sin and death, providing eternal life to anyone who believes. No other person's life-past, present, or future-has accomplished such a feat. There will never be anyone like Jesus, and because of what happened Easter morning we will have the privilege of spending eternity with Him.

I believe in the Resurrection primarily because I have gotten to know God. I know that God is love, and I also know that we human beings want to keep alive those whom we love. I do not let my friends die; they live on in my memory and my heart long after I have stopped seeing them. For whatever reason — human freedom lies at the core, I imagine — God allows a planet where a man dies scuba diving in the prime of life and a woman dies in a fiery crash on the way to a church missions conference. But I believe — if I did not believe this, I would not believe in a loving God — that God is not satisfied with such a blighted planet. Divine love will find a way to overcome. “Death, be not proud,” wrote John Donne: God will not let death win.
