Briefly, from the Rector

This year, the months of September and October are special for our parish. For it was on September 6, 1959 that our parish had its very first gathering, in a local school cafeteria. And on October 18, 1959, the feast day of St. Luke's the Physician, the Bishop of Kansas granted us official status as a mission parish in the Diocese of Kansas. Therefore, 2009 is the fiftieth anniversary of our establishment. Recently, I was digging around some papers in the bottom drawer of my filing cabinet and I came across the following document. It was untitled though clearly it is an early history of St. Luke's. And though it was unsigned, someone scribbled at the bottom of the last page "Written by Bob Cavitt." I thought you would enjoy reading it and, since it's not too long, include it in its entirety here.

St. Luke's was conceived in the mind of Dr. Robert Folsom Cavitt, MD, a layreader "reading-in" to Holy Orders in 1959. We asked our bishop, the Right Reverend Edward Clark Turner for permission to hold services in the multi-purpose room of Hocker Grove Junior High. This was granted and the first service, on the first Sunday after Labor Day, 1959, was held at 11 A.M. Newspaper coverage was limited to an announcement of the Event in a column 1/2 inch long. No prior canvassing of the commu-

nity was done. Three families plus Dr. Cavitt's family attended. Church school and Adult coffee class were started at 10 A.M. News of the new church family spread, by word of mouth and more persons came.

We petitioned the bishop to be organized as a diocesan mission. This petition was granted and we became a mission on St. Luke's Day, October 18, 1959. The name of the church was suggested by the layreader in charge, dr. cavitt. Dr. cavitt's ministry has been no stipendiary from the beginning to the present. His secular vocation is general surgery.

Our first music was the school piano. Ecclesiastical appointments were kept in a casket crate stored under the stage. Said crate had to be locked to keep the custodian from drinking the wine during the service. From the beginning there was religion and we grew in numbers.

Our altar was a cafeteria table covered by a lace tablecloth. Candlesticks were crystal from the dinner table. The cross was made by one of the members. The altar cross and processional cross were made of wood by each of two families. The offering plate was brass ornamental with Moslem designs, hailing from Tripoli



and was loaned by one of the families. The Lectern Bible was a loaned family Bible.

The service was Morning Prayer because Dr. Cavitt was not ordained. The Reverend Thomas A. Simpson, chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital, and soon-after retired brought communion once a month. Our first advent, we put purple veils on the crosses!! They came off after the service when we were informed the veils were for Passiontide!!

Acolytes vestments were made by the ladies.

Our first Christmas the pianist was drunk so a 14 year old girl in the congregation played "Silent Night" with one finger of her right hand. We sang the same hymn every Sunday - "I Sing a Song of the Saints of God" - because no one knew how to play the piano until Mr. William Lattimer arrived Christmas Eve, 1960, and started a brilliant musical career at St. Luke's as Organist, Choir Director, and Bass-Bari-tone soloist.

We needed a church site. It was chosen: the price was \$30,000 and was loaned to us by the Diocese. This was in 1960.

By then, Dr. Cavitt became Vicar and he was ordained Deacon at our cathedral on St. Luke's Day.

On July 1, 1961, Dr. Cavitt was due to become Chief Resident in Surgery at K.U. so help was sought to assume some of the church responsibilities during that last year of his Residency. The Reverend George Andrew Burns, a close friend of Dr. Cavitt was sought as a teammate min-

ister. The bishop agreed, and he came to St. Luke's for one year, beginning July 1, 1961.

By then, Dr. Cavitt had become Father Cavitt. His ordination on April 9, 1961, was the only time there was no service at St. Luke's. The entire congregation went to our cathedral to participate. The ladies gave Father Cavitt a magnificent set of Eucharistic vestments, which he still wears. Holy Communion became the service as it would have been from the first had Dr. Cavitt been a priest at the start.

Father Burns brought the plans for a church with him. It was built and moved in in the summer of 1962. We borrowed \$35,000 from Shawnee State Bank and \$20,000 from the Diocese of Kansas.

The altar, reredos, altar cross, and Eucharistic candlesticks were offered to Father Cavitt by his dear friend Father Harris Collingwood, rector of St. Paul's, Kansas City, Kansas. The offer was gratefully accepted, and these pieces were removed from St. Paul's and placed where they are now. Pews were borrowed from St. Michael's. They were the pews to the old Army Chapel that St. Michael's used previously.

On July 1, 1966, we called our first Curate, the Reverend Charles Kiblinger. That summer we incorporated as a parish and Father Cavitt was called as Rector. We were seated at the Diocesan Convention and our first Senior Warden, Dr. Herbert Wenner, was chosen as one of the four lay-delegates to General Convention.

The altar rail, pulpit and lec-

tern were designed to carry out the theme of the sanctuary pieces and it is a memorial. Mr. Lloyd Roark, who designed the sanctuary pieces and it is a memorial. The Processional Cross was designed by Osbourne's in England to match the sanctuary. It is a memorial. The communion silver was also designed by Osbourne's to match the sanctuary: they are memorials. The Missal Stand is a memorial but was purchased by the givers without prior consultation. It does not match the motif but happily harmonizes well. The flags are memorials. The swastika inside the pulpit was the work of vandals.

Vestments were designed and made

by the Sisters of the Holy Nativity, Fund-du-lac, Wisconsin. These were designed to go with the sanctuary. They were originally made to fit a 6'7" priest and have since been cut down so proportions may have suffered. The corporate seal is magnificent and is design with symbols of St. Luke's with the distinctive shape of St. Luke's crosses dominating. It was meant to be the coat of arms of St. Luke's and was designed by a member.

In the summer of 1967, Father Cavitt and his family moved to Alaska to try to repeat the miracle of St. Luke's. He felt at that time his work was finished at St. Luke's.

Sunday School News

The Pentecost Workshop was lots of fun. Thanks to helpers Russell Jones and Cheryl Ball, as well as ushers Brenda Carl and Victor Clarke. Look for the banner we made at the workshop! Plan to have your kids come to the next workshop, All Saint's Day, November 1, led by Peggy Cook and helpers.

This school year we are trying out a workshop format for Sunday School. About every 4-6 weeks there will be a seasonal workshop for children during the 10:15 service. On weeks when there is no workshop, we will have the usual Children's and Youth Chapels, and hopefully start up a Pre-school Chapel as well.

We need adults/high school students who can design and carry out or help supervise a workshop. The dates can be somewhat flexible and I can put you in touch with materials and ideas.

For young people who arrive for the 9:15 a.m. Adult Education time, we have put together

some "Sunday School-in-a-bag" activities that can be done during that time.

The PreSchool Chapel also needs volunteers. This will meet during the 10:15 service in the nursery and consist of a short lesson appropriate for toddlers through four year olds. There is a sign up sheet on the bulletin board in the hall. This involves no planning on your part since there is a book to work out of. High school students who need service hours can work with either workshops or PreSchool Chapel and receive credit.

Note the Pentecost Banner!

The basis of the banner now hanging in the church was the Pentecost story, when the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus' disciples and friends. There are several vigorous whirlwinds on the banner and it is safe to assume that any figure topped off with yellow, orange, or red above its head is receiving the Holy Spirit. Notice the many doves representing the Holy Spirit also. In addition to the actual events of the day of Pentecost, we read and illustrated stories that appear in the Year B lectionary as lessons during the season of Pentecost. The figures on green back-grounds show Jesus healing people. Other tall figures represent the Old Testament characters Samuel receiving the call of God, David, Hannah, Elijah, and the Widow. The artists were Henry, Ellis, Emma, Dakota, Chloe, Owen, and Cheryl, who received technical supervision from Mikala. Many thanks to them for sharing their talents.

A Moment of Meditation ...

"Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels un-
awares." — *Hebrews 13:2*

Who really cared? His was a routine admission to busy Bellevue Hospital. A charity case, one among hundreds. An unconscious bum from the Bowery with a bleeding gash on his face and neck.

The derelict's name was misspelled on the hospital form, but then what good is a name when the guy is a bum? The age was also incorrect. He was thirty-eight, not thirty-nine, and looked twice that. Somebody might have remarked, "What a shame for one so young." But no one did. Because no one cared.

A friend seeking him was directed to the local morgue. There, among dozens of other nameless corpses, he was identified. When they scraped together his belongings, they found a ragged, dirty coat with thirty-eight cents in one pocket and a scrap of paper in the other. All his earthly goods. Enough coins for another night in the Bowery and five words, "Dear friends and gentle hearts." Almost like the words of a song, someone may have thought.

Which would have been correct, for once upon a time that man had written the songs that literally made the whole world sing. Songs like "Camp-town Races," "Oh! Susanna," "Beautiful Dreamer," "I dream of Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair," "Old Folks at Home," "My Old Kentucky Home," and two hundred more that have become deeply rooted in our rich American heritage.

Today, some of these forgotten souls are in prison. Some in hospitals. Some in nursing homes, and some silently slip into church on

Sunday morning, confused and afraid. Do you care enough "to show hospitality to strangers," as Hebrews 13:2 puts it?

I know a person who cared. He served breakfast at St. Paul's regularly on Saturdays with St. Luke's team. He participated in the annual walk for Multiple Sclerosis.

It also says that in doing so, we occasionally "entertain angels without knowing it.

He must have entertained many angels without knowing.

Angles who don't look anything like angels. Some might even look like bums from the Bowery, but they may have a song dying in their hearts because nobody knows and nobody cares.

Pull a sheet of scratch paper out of your memory bank and see how well you do with the following questions:

Who taught Martin Luther his theology and inspired his translation of the New Testament?
Who was this person whose thirst for knowledge led him to regularly attend the Sunday Morning Bible study and Wednesday afternoon refresher? It is said that he had thought provoking questions.

Who visited with Dwight L. Moody at a shoe store and spoke to him about Christ?
Who was this person – a vestry member, chalice bearer, Lay Eucharist visitor and choir member?

Who was the wife of Charles Haddon Spurgeon?
Who was this special person of St. Luke's who will be missed so much but his memories will linger all over the church? At the entrance into St. Luke's (the church sign), in the church (small engraved golden crosses in the church and the altar banners), in the children's chapel

(a beautiful painting of "Jesus loves little children"), in the parish hall (the recycle sign), in the church yard (ask the others – he was always there to rake the leaves) and in the memory of St.Luke's parishioners.

Who was the elderly woman who prayed faithfully for Billy Graham for over twenty years?
Who was this person who dedicated his time and talent for his Church for many years. I am sure he prayed faithfully for his church over these years.

Who helped Charles Wesley get underway as a composer of hymns?
Who was this person who sang in the church choir as a tenor?

Who were parents of the godly and gifted prophet Daniel?
Who is this person who will continue to touch the lives of others through his legacy-the Endowment Fund?

Okay, how'd you do? Before you excuse your inability to answer these questions by calling the quiz "trivia," better stop and think. Had it not been for such unknown persons – such "nobodies" – a huge chunk of church history would be missing. And a lot of lives would have been untouched.

Nobodies. What a necessary band of men and women – servants of the King – yet nameless in the kingdom! Men and women who with silent heroism and faithful diligence, relinquish the limelight and live in the shade of public figures.

As Jim Elliot, martyred messenger of the gospel to the Aucas once remarked: "Missionaries are a bunch of nobodies trying to exalt Somebody."

Praise God! We're among the elite group mentioned in 1 Corinthians 12, "some of the parts that seem weakest and least important are the really the most necessary ... So God has put the body together in such a way that extra honor and care are given to those parts that might otherwise seem less important." (vv. 22, 24, TLB).

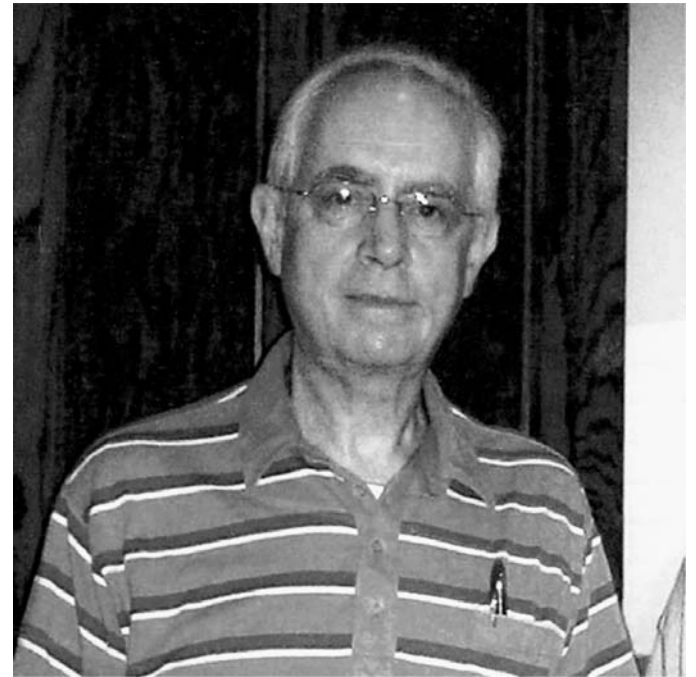
If it weren't for the heroic "nobodies," we wouldn't have any sound or light or heat or air conditioning in our churches next Sunday.

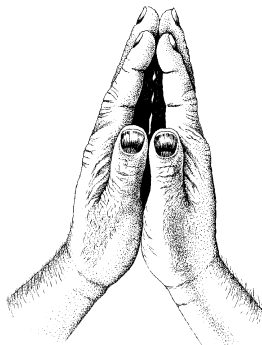

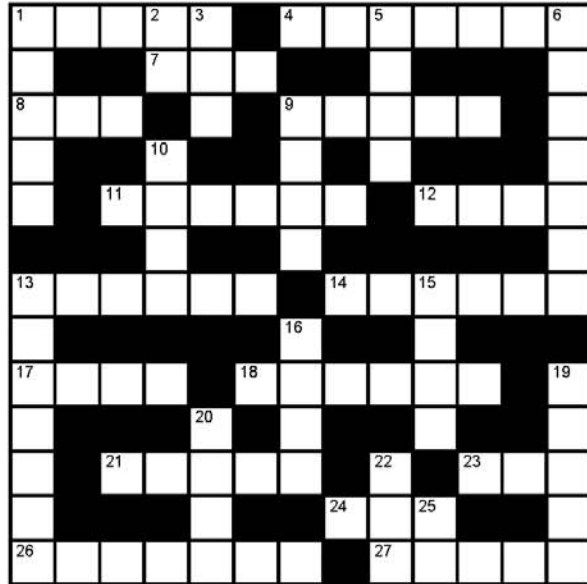
