# Food for Thought

I have long subscribed to the electronic weekly publication *Sightings*. It is produced by The Martin Marty Center for the Advanced Study of Religion. Its purpose is to “seek out and comment on the events, agents, and trends in public life where issues of religion are writ large, in plain view — or are simmering under the surface.” Given the recent news that the Roman Catholic Church has taken steps to make it easier for Anglican and Episcopal clergy to convert to Catholicism, the most recent edition of *Sightings* was timely. I reproduce it here in total for your reading.

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## “Anglicans and Rome”

The top ecumenical — some are saying un- or anti-ecumenical — news of the year occurred October 20th with a Vatican announcement. Bypassing forty years of Anglican-Roman Catholic conversations-cum-negotiations and blindsiding Archbishop Rowan Williams, the head of the seventy-million-member Anglican Communion, Vatican officials announced that they were taking steps to receive Anglican (in the United States, Episcopal) clergy through conversion into the Roman Catholic priesthood. Headlines had it that Rome wanted to “lure,” “attract,” “bid for” or “woo” priests and congregations to make the drastic move, while the Vatican front man, as he fished for Anglicans, said he was not fishing for Anglicans.

What was behind the move? It was hard to read as a positive ecumenical gesture — Pope Benedict XVI has made some — since it did not revoke or revise what the Pope in 1896 declared and what is always reinforced: Anglican “orders,” for sacramental credentialing, were “absolutely null and utterly void.” As recently as last year, Rome’s ecumenical officer and Anglicanism’s ecumenical partner, “good guy” Cardinal Walter Kasper, spoke softly but carried a huge stick when he charged that some parts of Anglicanism had made things worse: Is it that

the orders are now absolutely-absolutely and utterly-utterly null and void? The pope visits the U.K. next year. Wait and see.

What was at issue? There were subtleties on the side, irritations which had not yet prompted a radical twist, but observers agreed that a) ordaining women as priests and b) ordaining a gay bishop and more gay priests were the grand offenses. In the good old days Christian bodies fought over the Trinity, the Incarnation, Salvation, and Sacraments. In our epoch they and the media who cover them converge obsessively on issues of sex-and-gender, where contraception and abortion, “women” and “gays,” are the flame issues. Some Anglican moves have long alienated significant minorities; four dioceses and some parishes beyond them have pulled out of the Episcopal Church in the USA. They already sought and found what is legitimate and strategic in their sight, the cover provided by especially African Anglicans who also abhor gay and women priests.

Some Episcopal priests seemed ripe for plucking, and Rome set out to harvest, even if the Church will thus be accepting some married priests, while leaving their own home-grown priests-who-marry in exile. Those with even slight suspicion suspect that the Vatican initiative is also a desperation move to help solve the shortage of priests in the Roman communion. Some of the only half-gruntled Anglicans have uttered some “not-so-fast!” or “count-me-out!” cautions. As one leader among them reminded, “there was a Reformation, you remember,” as he spoke for those who knew that being received by Rome, even with gestures that would allow Anglican converts some liturgical and traditional free range, still demands a great doctrinal gulp. Converts would have to accept papal infallibility and, with it, the infallible doctrine (1950) of the bodily Assumption of the Blessed Virgin and other teachings which long offended non-Roman Catholics.

Archbishop Rowan Williams, though embarrassed by the surprise announcement of dealings behind his back, was characteristically

Williamsian and old-style Anglican, as he reacted not in anger but with patience. The Anglican communion for centuries aspired to promote “comprehension,” doing what it could to prevent heresy and schism but in a spirit of openness. The papal visit next year will occasion fresh thinking and policies.

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### Some Good Thoughts for The Episcopal Church

Something deep in me responds to the sweet and tempered ways of the Episcopal Church. Its atmosphere of reverence, its ordered and stately worship, its tradition of historic continuity, linking today with ages ago; its symbols which enshrine the faith of the past and the hope of the future; its wise and wide tolerance; its old and lovely liturgy – like a stairway, worn by many feet, whereon men climb to God – and, still more, the organized mysticism of its sacraments – all these things of beauty and grace move me profoundly.

More vital still, if possible, is the central and strategic position which the Episcopal Church holds in the confused religious situation of our time. It is the roomiest Church in Christendom, in that it accepts the basic facts of Christian faith as symbols of transparent truths, which each may interpret as his insight explores their depth and wonder.

Midway between an arid liberalism and an acrid orthodoxy, it keeps its wise course, conserving the eternal values of faith while seeking to read the Word of God revealed in the tumult of the time. If its spirit and attitude were better understood, it would be at once the haven and the home of many vexed minds torn between loyalty to the old faith and the new truth.

After all, there is one Church of Christ. It may wear many names, but its faith is one, and finally,

soon or late, it will be one fellowship, drawn together by creative desire, or driven together by sheer necessity of facing the forces of destruction in our day, which, if they have their way, will end in materialism and futility. Each man should labor where he can do his best work in behalf of our common Christian enterprise; and I look forward to happy and fruitful service in a great and gracious fellowship.

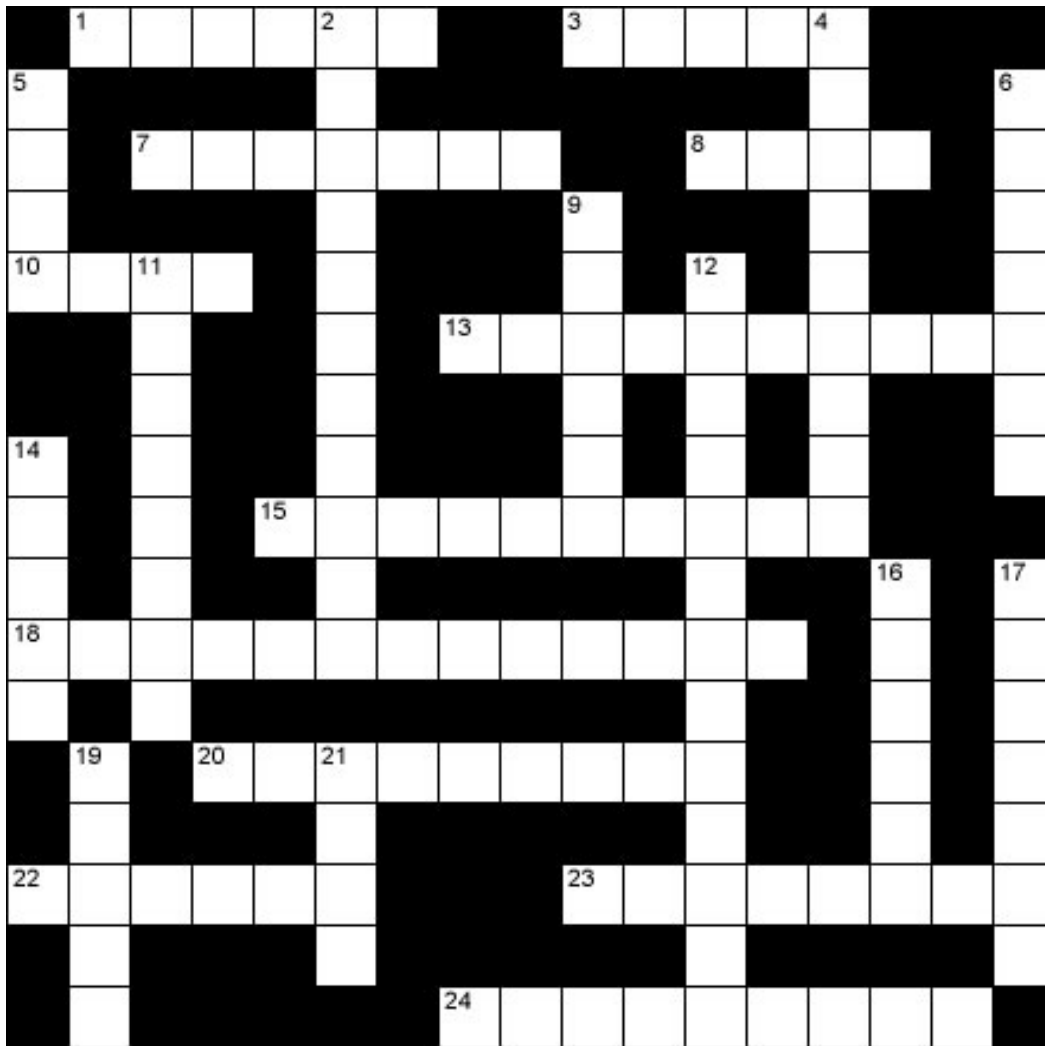

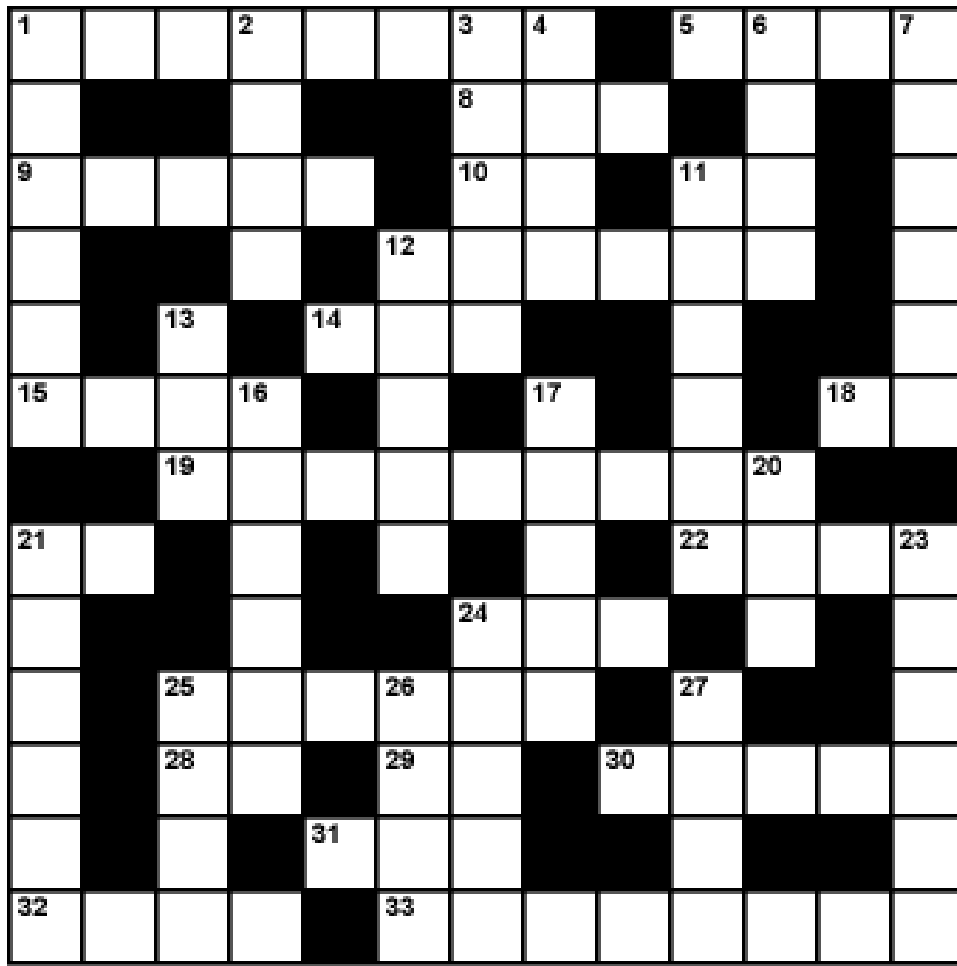

# A Moment of Meditation ...

“Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God.”

– *Philippians 4:6*

Life is hard, and every day is challenging. You may be wondering just now if you can go on. Perhaps another person is vexing you. Perhaps you’ve been maligned or criticized. You’re discouraged with unanswered prayer. Maybe you’re feeling like Elijah under the broom tree, wanting to die.

Try praying with thanksgiving. A thankful attitude is the cure for many emotional ailments. Take depression, for example. What is depression or discouragement except the total collapse of thanksgiving in our lives?

Thanksgiving is also the opposite of discontent. It’s easy for us to become disgruntled with various factors in our lives; but let’s be like one man who was thankful . . .

– For the clothes that fit a little too snug because it means I have enough to eat.

– For all the complaining I hear about the government because it means that I have freedom of speech.

– For the alarm that goes off in the early morning hours because it means that I am alive.

– For the teenager who is not doing dishes but is watching TV because that means he is at home and not on the streets.

– For the taxes that I pay because it means that I’m employed.

– For the lawn that needs mowing, windows that need cleaning, and gutters that need fixing because it means I have a home.

– For weariness at the end of the day because it means I have been capable of working hard.

– For the parking spot I find at the far end of the parking lot because it means I am capable of walking and that I have been blessed with transportation.

Thanksgiving is the opposite of anxiety. Philippians 4:6: “Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God.” Worship and worry cannot live in the same heart. They are mutually exclusive, according to Ruth Graham.

Thanksgiving is also the corrective for sadness and even grief. While working on a message from Psalm 100, my phone rang. It was from a family dear to me. Our children were about the same age and had played together growing up.

The caller told me there had been an accident in the woods, and a portion of a tree had fallen on one of the boys. He’d been pinned for over an hour before the ambulance arrived, and it appeared the young man would be paralyzed from the waist down. His spinal cord had been crushed.

Well, that just destroyed my afternoon. I couldn’t get it out of my mind. This was a blond-headed kid, very athletic, full of life; and in one moment, his life was shattered and changed. I wrestled with my own thoughts and emotions until evening, then I placed a call to the intensive care unit of the hospital. Frankly, I didn’t know what to say; but I didn’t have to say much at all. The boy’s father ended up comforting me.

He said, “Pastor, I want you to know that my wife and I are, first of all, thankful that our son is alive. Second, we’re thanking God that it wasn’t the upper part of his body that was paralyzed.

And thirdly, though we don't understand why, we know God is good and that somehow in the midst of this, He has a plan for our son's life that must go beyond anything we can imagine. Though it's hard and we wish it hadn't happened, we have committed it to our God, for He is good."

I hung up the phone and went back to Psalm 100 and thought - how it changes any situation to enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise!

Is the race of life wearing you down? Try a moment of thanks. Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise. Be thankful unto Him and bless His name. Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests to God. And the peace of God that passes all understanding will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

Another person I would thank God for is Maxine Jones for her diligence in sending out timely prayer requests in "Pulse of the Parish", even though sometimes I am apprehensive about her e-mails, not knowing if it is an unanswered prayer or another prayer challenge to test our faith or a moment to say, "Thank you, Father!"

As I contemplate the past years during this Thanksgiving season, I am thankful that I am a child in my God's eyes and He will take care of me! I just need to ask, trust and say, Thank you!

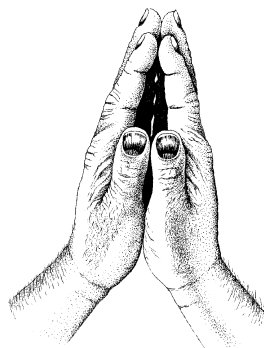
