

The Way of Love in Lent Adult Forums for Lent

About "Life Transformed: The Way of Love in Lent"



The journey through Lent into Easter is a journey with Jesus. We are baptized into his life, self- giving, and death; then, we rise in hope to life transformed. This Lent, communities are invited to walk with Jesus in his Way of Love and into the experience of transformed life. Together, we will reflect anew on the loving actions of God as recounted in the Easter Vigil readings. Together, we will walk through the depths of salvation history into the fullness of redemption.

This set of seven Adult Forums ties the Easter Vigil readings to the seven practices of the Way of Love. Drawing on the ancient practice of setting aside Lent as a period of study and preparation for living as a Christian disciple (known as the catechumenate), the forums

encourage participants to reflect on salvation history; walk toward the empty tomb; and embrace the transforming reality of love, life, and liberation. As we stand with the three women at the empty tomb, we hear his call to go and live that transformed reality.

You do not have to live or work in Clay County to receive a vaccination at Operation Safe



Support people in the Middle East through the Good Friday Offering

Again this year Presiding Bishop Michael Curry is encouraging Episcopalians to support the ministry of the Anglican Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East by donating through the annual Good Friday Offering.

First gathered in 1922, the initial Good Friday Offering was an intentional response of the Episcopal Church to support Anglican ministries in the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East that were impacted by the devastation of World War I, the Spanish flu pandemic, and social and political unrest affecting Armenian Christians, among others throughout that region. Of the need this year, Bishop Curry said, "This prior era a century ago reminds us that ours is not the only time in which forces beyond our control affect the lives of God's people. We are all aware that the Covid-19 pandemic has affected virtually every person on the planet in one way or another. . .

"I am sorely aware of the needs of our own families, churches and communities in this most difficult time. For those who are able to give, the Good Friday Offering is a reminder for our Anglican brothers and sisters in the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East that the Episcopal Church stands in solidarity with them in Jesus' Name."
